It is my intention to continue to pursue excellence in the human connection and distinction in the field of medicine. It is my hope to one day return to the communities in which I grew up in to serve the many vulnerable populations as a conduit for health promotion, literacy, and education. Through advocacy and legislation, community memberships and volunteerism, I hope to move in action of these words to create a positive change in society and those around me.

I am working towards not only being a leader in my community, but a change agent in a medical system that is failing to provide for the most vulnerable of populations. One of my goals as an Osteopathic Physician is to be a voice within underrepresented communities throughout my profession.
