Whereas, the Tenets of Osteopathic Medicine acclaim that, "The body is a unit; the person is unit of body, mind and spirit," now, therefore be it,

Resolved, that

As Osteopathic philosophy describes the body as an aggregation of inert atoms, the concept of "body-mind-spirit" can be described with modern scientific language:

- The "body," including the brain, is an aggregation of inert atoms from Earth's environment.
- "Spirit" or "consciousness" likely does not arise from the inert atoms that are aggregated to form the brain but may be a form of energy that was released during the Big Bang that did not become atoms. Approximately 5% of the energy released during the Big Bang became matter, became atoms, therefore 95% of the universe could be described as "non-material" and yet to be methodically evaluated by modern science.
- "Mind" arises from the interaction of the material body and brain and the non-material consciousness or spirit.

A metaphor for body-mind-spirit is that:

The body and brain are like a <u>saxophone</u>, an aggregation of atoms whose structure and function are related,
